

# KOREAN (EALK)

## EALK 10001 Elementary Korean I (3 Credit Hours)

This is the beginning course of the sequence of two three-credit courses, a sequence that covers the same materials as First Year Korean I. This elementary course is designed for students who have no prior knowledge in Korean and provides a solid foundation in modern Korean starting from Korean alphabet Hangul. Emphasis is placed on the fundamentals of listening, speaking, reading, and writing of basic Korean. In addition, students will be exposed to everyday life contexts likely to be encountered in contemporary Korean society.

## EALK 10002 Elementary Korean II (3 Credit Hours)

This course is a continuation of Elementary Korean I. It is the second half of the two 3-credit course sequence (Elementary Korean I and II) that covers the same materials as the 5-credit First Year Korean I. Upon completion of this course, students will be ready to enroll in First Year Korean II (5 credits) in the following spring semester. Students will continue their acquisition of the four basic language skills in Korean: reading, writing, speaking and listening. At the end of semester students will be able to understand and articulate basic idiomatic expressions and grammatical patterns (e.g., sentence structure, levels, verb tenses) and develop their understanding of aspects of Korean culture.

Prerequisites: EALK 10001

## EALK 10111 First Year Korean I (3 Credit Hours)

This introductory course is designed for students who have no (or very limited) prior knowledge in Korean and provides a solid foundation in modern Korean starting from Korean alphabet Hangul. Emphasis is placed on the fundamentals of listening, speaking, reading, and writing of basic Korean. In addition, students will be exposed to everyday life contexts likely to be encountered in contemporary Korean society. At the end of semester students will be able to understand and articulate basic idiomatic expressions and grammatical patterns (e.g., sentence structure, speech levels, verb tenses) in conversation and writing and develop their understanding of aspects of Korean culture. First Year Korean I is a 5 credit course; students should enroll in both EALK 10111 and EALK 11111.

## EALK 10112 First-Year Korean II (3 Credit Hours)

This introductory course is designed to provide beginners with a solid foundation in modern Korean on the basis of what we covered in First Year Korean I during the fall semester. Throughout the course we will focus on the balanced development of the four basic language skills of speaking, listening comprehension, reading, and writing. By the end of the semester, students will be able to understand (through reading and listening) and express (via speaking and writing) more complex expressions and structures (e.g., using clausal connectives) and will further develop their understanding of Korean culture. First Year Korean II is a 5 credit course; students should enroll in the MWF (EALK 10112) section and choose one T (EALK 1112) lab.

Corequisites: EALK 11112

## EALK 10211 First Year Korean I - 3 Credit Option (3 Credit Hours)

This introductory course is designed for students who have no (or very limited) prior knowledge in Korean and provides a solid foundation in modern Korean starting from Korean alphabet Hangul. Emphasis is placed on the fundamentals of listening, speaking, reading, and writing of basic Korean. In addition, students will be exposed to everyday life contexts likely to be encountered in contemporary Korean society. At the end of semester students will be able to understand and articulate basic idiomatic expressions and grammatical patterns (e.g., sentence structure, speech levels, verb tenses) in conversation and writing and develop their understanding of aspects of Korean culture. This class is the 3 credit option for First Year Korean I with no drill component.

## EALK 11002 Elementary Korean II - Independent Study (2 Credit Hours)

This course is a continuation of Elementary Korean I. It is the second half of the two 3-credit course sequence (Elementary Korean I and II) that covers the same materials as the 5-credit First Year Korean I. Upon completion of this course, students will be ready to enroll in First Year Korean II (5 credits) in the following spring semester. Students will continue their acquisition of the four basic language skills in Korean: reading, writing, speaking and listening. At the end of semester students will be able to understand and articulate basic idiomatic expressions and grammatical patterns (e.g., sentence structure, levels, verb tenses) and develop their understanding of aspects of Korean culture.

## EALK 11111 First Year Korean I Drill (2 Credit Hours)

EALK 11111 is the corequisite lab to EALK 10111

## EALK 11112 First Year Korean II Drill (2 Credit Hours)

This course is the corequisite lab for EALK 10111 First Year Korean I. This is an intensive introduction to the fundamentals of modern Korea. The class meets five days per week. This course is designed for students who have not studied Korean language before. The goal of this class is to gain an acquisition of the four basic language skills in Korean: reading, writing, speaking and listening. Students will learn to read and write and to develop conversational skills.

## EALK 20211 Second Year Korean I (3 Credit Hours)

This second year Korean is for students who have successfully finished EALK 10112 or who have permission from the instructor after taking the Korean placement exam. Students will continue building their language skills with emphasis on enhancing speaking ability, writing skills, and usage of more complex constructions. The medium of instruction will be only in Korean and students are expected to use the target language as much as they can throughout the course. Second Year Korean I is a 5 credit course; students should enroll in both EALK 20211 and the EALK 21211.

Prerequisites: EALK 10112

Corequisites: EALK 21211

## EALK 20212 Second-Year Korean II (3 Credit Hours)

This course is the second semester of an intermediate course on spoken and written Korean for learners who have completed Second Year Korean I or the equivalent. It is designed to continue building students' language skills with emphasis on enhancing the speaking ability, writing skills, and usage of more complex constructions. The medium of instruction will be in Korean and students are expected to use the target language as much as possible. Second Year Korean II is a 5 credit course; students should enroll in the MWF (EALK 20212) section and choose one R (EALK 21212) lab.

Corequisites: EALK 21212

**EALK 21211 Second Year Korean I Drill (2 Credit Hours)**

EALK 21211 is the corequisite lab to EALK 20211.

**EALK 21212 Second Year Korean Drill (2 Credit Hours)**

Corequisite: EALK 20212 This course is the corequisite lab for Second Year Korean II EALK 20212.

**EALK 30311 Third Year Korean I (3 Credit Hours)**

This third year Korean is fifth in a series of Korean language courses offered at the University of Notre Dame and is designed for students who have successfully finished EALK 20212 or who have gotten permission from the instructor after taking a placement test. This course aims to develop functional proficiency in Korean at the intermediate-high level in listening, speaking, and reading and writing. Students will develop competence in fluency, grammatical accuracy and socio-linguistic/cultural appropriateness through a variety of activities and assignments. In addition, students will learn to communicate with more sophisticated grammatical structures and advanced vocabulary on various topics. This course will integrate Korean cultural themes with language learning to enhance students' learning of Korean language and to deepen their understanding of Korean culture. The specific themes that we are going to explore this semester are 1) appropriate pragmatics when apologizing, requesting, and denying, 2) the difference between indigenous language and Sino-Korean, 3) the Koreans' way of thinking which is reflected in language, and 4) social relation of Korean people, and so on. The course focuses on exploring 5Cs (Communication, Cultures, Connections, Comparisons, and Communities) through more in-depth studies of Korean language and culture. Third Year Korean I is a 4 credit course; students should enroll in both EALK 30311 and EALK 31311-01.

**EALK 30312 Third Year Korean II (4 Credit Hours)**

This course is the second semester of Advanced Intermediate Korean which is designed for students who have successfully finished EALK 30311 or who have gotten permission from the instructor after taking a placement test. This course is a content-based course and will integrate Korean cultural themes with language learning to enhance students' acquisition of Korean language and to deepen their understanding of Korean culture. Selected readings and multiple genres of media such as films with English subtitle, TV commercials, poems, and short essays will be introduced in this course. The purpose of this course is not to suggest a normative way of Korean living or generalize Korean culture, but to study diverse ways of living and to critically examine personal and social implications of the various modes of culture. The course focuses on exploring 5Cs (Communication, Cultures, Connections, Comparisons, and Communities) through more in-depth studies of Korean language and culture. Third Year Korean II is a 4 credit course; students should enroll in both EALK 30311 and EALK 31311-01.

**EALK 31311 Third Year Korean I Drill (0 Credit Hours)**

Lab for EALK 30311.

**EALK 31312 Third Year Korean II Lab (0 Credit Hours)**

**EALK 40400 Contemporary Korean Language and Culture I (3 Credit Hours)**

This course is designed for students who are trying to elevate their Korean language proficiency level, from Intermediate to Advanced level, by challenging themselves to understand Korean authentic/ modified media materials such as Korean TV dramas, TV shows, TV news, or documentaries. It is also designed to introduce students to contemporary Korean popular culture and the Korean culture wave. An understanding of the oral and visual authenticity of Korean media materials not only gives students a rich and varied context in which they learn the target language, but also provides an exposure to the vocabulary and grammatical structures which are beyond the students' current proficiency level. Through the contextually very-rich texts of media materials and through frequent discussions and feedback sessions, this course will also offer students an opportunity to increase their awareness about Korean culture, a crucial element in advancing their proficiency to the Advanced level. Adapting interactive and elaborated task-based and content-based instructional designs, including four modes of language learning (speaking, listening, reading and writing), this course assists and motivates students to obtain the two main objectives; increasing Korean language proficiency and gaining valuable cultural awareness. The purpose of this course is not to suggest a normative way of Korean living or generalize Korean culture, but to study diverse ways of living and to critically examine personal and social implications of the various modes of culture.

Satisfies the following University Core Requirements: WKLC-Core Adv Lang & Culture

**EALK 46000 Directed Readings (1-3 Credit Hours)**

Directed study of special topics under the direction of a faculty member. Agreement by the faculty member and the Director of Undergraduate Studies required.

**EALK 46498 Directed Readings (3 Credit Hours)**

Requires "contractual agreement" with the professor prior to scheduling. For advanced students who wish to pursue an independent research project reading Korean language materials.

Course may be repeated.
